BOUQUET * COLLAGE

Topics: color, mark-making, texture, painting, collage, illustration **Supplies:**




- paper (plain white, newspaper, magazine pages, or paper bags)
- paint
- a cup for water
- paintbrushes
- scissors
- glue
- optional: a fork and old toothbrush

Are there flowers in your neighborhood? Maybe they are for sale at the store, growing in a park, or on display in a vase at your home. A lot of people like flowers because they are bright and colorful!

VINCENT VAN GOGH

Vincent Van Gogh was an artist who painted flowers. He also painted lots of other things. Van Gogh was born in the Netherlands in 1843. Take a look at some of his paintings:



What do you notice about Van Gogh's paintings? How do they make you feel? Van Gogh's paintings are called **post-impressionism**. This means that he was more interested in communicating a feeling with his paintings than making sure they looked realistic.

VINCENT VAN GOGH

Van Gogh used mark-making and color to create texture as well as express movement and emotion. When you look closely, you can see each individual mark that he made with his paint brush. What colors can you see?

COLOR WHEEL




In Van Gogh's self portrait (click here to zoom in really close!), the blue background has orange spots and his red beard has bits of green. These colors are called complementary colors.

Complementary colors are


opposite of one another on a

color wheel.





Colors that are next to each other on a color wheel are called **analogous colors**. Can you spot any analogous colors in Van Gogh's self portrait?



ERIC CARLE

Eric Carle is an artist who also uses mark-making to create texture. Eric Carle is an illustrator. An **illustrator** is somebody who makes pictures that tell a story. There are many different ways to tell stories with pictures. Some illustrators paint their pictures or draw them with a pen. Others use a camera and some even use clay. Eric Carle is an illustrator who tells stories by making collages for books. **Collage** is a type of art that is made when you adhere different papers and objects to a surface.



To make his collages, Eric Carle cuts paper into shapes and glues them onto a background. He uses papers, called **paste papers**, that he paints with different colors and textures. Watch a <u>video</u> (1:50-2:40) of Eric Carle making paste papers in his studio. How does he use colors similarly to Van Gogh?

Let's make a bouquet collage!

Begin by painting paste papers. What kind of flowers do you want Add different colors to each paper. to make? What colors will they be? Observe and take pictures of How does your paper change flowers in your neighborhood and when you mix complementary home or ask an adult to look up colors or analogous colors? Add photos online. texture by dipping your brush in water, using a dry brush, or running a fork through wet paint to make lines. Try using an old toothbrush to splatter paint. Dip the toothbrush in paint and run your finger along the bristles. Once your paste papers have dried, use scissors to cut out flower petals. There are lots of different kinds of petals. Many can be drawn using just circles and triangles. What other petal shapes can you make?


Let's make a bouquet collage!

4 Cut out other details like leaves and a vase.



Arrange your pieces on a background. If you don't have white paper, you can paint a piece of cardboard!







REFLECTION

Eric Carle's favorite color is yellow. He said:

"If I use red and put another color in it, it stays red, and if I use blue and mix it with another color, it remains blue. But the minute that I put yellow into another color...it becomes muddy. So it's a challenge for me, and that's why yellow is my favorite color."

Do you have a favorite color? What color is a challenge for you?



Take a look at your paper bouquet. What do you notice? How are your collage flowers different than if you had painted them with solid colors? Is there somebody you would like to give your flowers to? Flowers can be a nice way to say "thank you" or make someone you care about smile!
